- What has been achieved (Phases I and II)
 - − 1 Message: The four building blocks
 - Ownership
 - Involve road users in management of roads
 - Financing
 - Secure a stable flow of funds for adequate road maintenance
 - Responsibility
 - Ensure all parties know their responsibilities
 - Management
 - Implement a clear system of accountability

- What has been achieved (Phases I and II, cont.)
 - 2 Milestones
 - SSA-wide awareness on road maintenance
 - Donor Code of Conduct for road maintenance
 - New generation of road funds
 - Yaounde Declaration on sustained road maintenance by Year 2000
 - SADC and ECOWAS Resolutions on road management and financing

- What has been achieved (Phases I and II, cont.)
 - − 3 Impact on reform
 - Priority for road maintenance duly acknowledged in PSERs and in sector financing operations
 - Eight RMI active core and five associated countries mostly in Eastern Africa
 - Implementation of the four building blocks uneven, and unlikely to exceed 50% average achievement
 - Greater impact in financing
 - Lower impact in management and ownership

 - 1 Making commercialization happen: a compact for sector reform
 - Explicit and equitable road pricing
 - Sustainable financing, particularly for maintenance
 - Corporatization of sector agencies
 - Development of the regulatory framework

- Envisaged Donor support
 - US\$2.0 million new commitments to meet the 1998/2000 financing gap
 - SSATP umbrella trust funds
 - US\$0.4 million additional funding to finance the missing high-level position in the Bank Team during 1999/2000 (previously financed by the Government of Japan)
 - Dedicated trust fund

- Monitoring the results on the ground
 - Implementation of reforms in member countries towards sustainable maintenance by year 2000
 - Progress assessed on a country-by-country basis during Annual Coordinating Meeting
 - Expansion in country assistance
 - 50% increase by 2000
 - Regular follow-up of network condition in SSA
 - System developed in 1999
