Workshop: Towards an African Road Safety Observatory

A common understanding and agreement for African countries to manage and monitor road safety performance

Original goal: A regional road safety observatory is operational in one REC

Current scope: An **African** road safety observatory is operational

Commitments: At Dakar Workshop in February 2018, 7 countries committed to explore the establishment an African observatory

Abuja Workshop: Engage more countries, establish project structure, develop minimum indicators

28 countries: participated



African Road Safety Observatory Second Workshop, Abuja

- Recall the outcomes of the first workshop held in Dakar: lack of harmonization of data collected by countries, the reporting of accidents,
- results of the online survey shared with representatives of member countries: its implementation is an opportunity to accelerate the improvement of data systems at the national level; a unique African observatory; the African Union could host the Observatory
- Reiterated the importance of road safety data, in the choice and planning of actions to be carried out and in the monitoring and evaluation of results and performance achieved
- introduced the concept of the African Road Safety Observatory as a formal network for representatives from African countries; a framework for exchange and discussion among experts; and a common database on road safety

African Road Safety Observatory Second Workshop, Abuja

- There is a lot of data on road safety in Africa: no less than 110 reports on 54 countries, which is a good basis for the African observatory; build on what we have
- However, there are challenges- the quality of police sources and the absence of vital registration data
- An initial list of 44 indicators to be collected at the national level was examined and enriched
- From this list the indicators to be collected at regional will be selected. These indicators will be classified according to the usual typology: accident data; risk exposure data; behavioral data



For an African Road Safety Observatory Second Workshop, Abuja

Outcome from the workshop:

- A steering committee of 8 countries to lead the discussions
- Two taskforces including:

A taskforce to deepen the mode of governance

A taskforce to prepare the work plan of the observatory for the initial period 2018-2020

- Some donor support already in place, need for ongoing national resources recognized
- 3rd workshop to in Marrakech, in November in conjuction with African Road Safety forum,

Day 3: Sharing experience and learning

- CITA: vehicles are a critical part of the safety equation, and there are very effective regulatory systems available to countries.
- Nigeria: road safety management underpins all activity of the Federal Road Safety Corps. A clear national strategy is in place
- **Sénégal:** A major project underway is to formally establish Organisme de Gestion de la Sécurité Routière (OGESER), an autonomous road safety lead agency with legal and financial backing.
- Maroc: A new second national strategy 2017-2026 takes the lessons from the first national strategy 2004-2013. New leadership committment illustrated by the 1st African Road Safety Forum in Marrakech, 13-15 November, 2018.

Inaugural meeting of Africa Regional Chapter of Global Network for Road Safety Legislators

- Parliamentary representatives from Benin, Cameroon, Ghana, Nigeria, Sénégal, Tanzania, Uganda
- Global Network Manifesto
- Many other points of discussion including
 - Parliamentary activities to promote road safety and scrutinize progress
 - Commitment for networking to build partnerships at country and sub regional levels
 - Road crash data
 - UN Road Safety Fund
 - National legislation opportunities
 - The Motorcycle challenge
 - Pedestrians, highways and roadside markets
 - Support for lead agencies



The Way Forward

- African Road Safety Leadership Program
- Deepening engagement at country and city level influencing policy and institutions – more countries committed to work with SSATP
- Provision of templates and guidelines to accelerate good practice policy and strategies
- More effective use of the RECs to create opportunities for road safety associations and networking at sub regional level
- Continued partnerships with key institutions and development partners working on road safety in Africa leveraging comparative advantage
